WEEK 1 - Creation

Have someone read the first sentence of the Catechism:

- CCC 1

Pause here and talk about this bible series. In this series of bible studies, we will look more deeply into what this paragraph is saying:

- 1. Why did God create us?
- 2. How is it that we became "scattered and divided by sin"?
- 3. How did he "call together all men"?
- 4. Who was his Son and how was he our Redeemer and Savior?
- 5. How do we become his adopted children?

Let's dig deeper into the first sentence. Have someone re-read that first sentence:

"God, infinitely perfect and blessed in himself, in a plan of sheer goodness freely created man to make him share in his own blessed life."

Q; What do they mean by the words "share in his own <u>blessed life</u>? What does his "blessed life" mean?

The next passage from the Catechism explains that. Have someone read this:

- CCC 221

Q: CCC 221 is talking about the Holy Trinity. What does the Church teach about the Holy Trinity? What do we believe about it?

- We believe that God is a Trinity of persons, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit that together love one another perfectly and infinitely, in essence, the Trinity is love itself.
- What's important for us to understand is the nature of the Trinity is love, and we are invited to participate in it.
- It's a mystery in the end, Jesus reveals it to us.

The Trinity is difficult for anyone to understand. Be careful not to get mired into deep theology that is beyond the scope of this study. It would suffice to acknowledge it as a mystery which requires faith to believe in. The most important point to convey about the Trinity is that God is a relationship of love and he wants to include us in it.

Q: How important do you think is the doctrine of the Holy Trinity as opposed to other doctrines or beliefs of the Church?

The answer is in CCC 234. Have someone read it.

- CCC 234
- Q: Why do you think the Holy Trinity is the central mystery, or central doctrine of the Church? Challenge the group to go beyond just repeating the words from the Catechism. Dig into the "why". It's about who God is, or the nature of God. From that, everything else flows.

Now let's turn our attention to the story of Creation. Have someone read:

- Genesis 1:26-27
- **Genesis 1:31**

You can point out to the group that before these passages, God created light, the earth, animals, etc., and after each day of creating he looked and said "it was good", but only after creating mankind did he say it was <u>very</u> good.

Q: Why did God create us?

Refer back to the first quote of the Catechism at the top of this study: "...in a plan of sheer goodness freely created man to make him share in his own blessed life".

- o He created us out of love
- He wants to share his blessed life with us
- People can share any other insights
- Q: What would us sharing in his blessed life look like practically?
- Q: Have you felt times when you were very close to God, very intimate with him?
- Q: Are there any obstacles that stand in the way of your becoming closer to God? Conversely, what helps you most to grow closer to God?
- Q: Protestants like to say you need to have a "personal relationship" with God. Based on what we read and learned today, do you think this is true?
- Q: Does God want to have an intimate, personal relationship with you? Where can you see that in the quotes and passages cited above?

Emphatically yes! He wants even more than that, he wants to unite us to him, to become one with him, similar to how a husband and wife become one in marriage. He not only wants that, he himself initiates that kind of relationship with us. Here are some quotes that should come out in the discussion:

- "God, infinitely perfect and blessed in himself, in a plan of sheer goodness freely created man to make him share in his own blessed life."
- "God draws close to man."
- "He calls man to seek him, to know him, to love him with all his strength."
- "...he invites men to become, in the Holy Spirit, his adopted children ..."
- "God himself is an eternal exchange of love, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and he has destined us to share in that exchange"
- "God looked at everything he had made, and found it very good." (emphasis on "very" after he made man).
- Q: Do you think that when God created man, he knew he would die on a cross to save him? This is a question intended to make people think. The answer is of course yes. And that is what is so beautiful, that he went through it anyway, despite the cost to himself. This should be a "lightbulb" moment for the participant's to reflect on just how much God loves them.
